lissa Jameson, director of Public Relations and Events; Miss Methodist. Larry Wells, professor of Photo by Dionne Drakes


music; Sharron McNair, professor of music; Kevin Allington, assistant baseball coach, and Sara Drake, professor of mass communication.

Sanford is an all-male, freshman dorm. Two people are assigned per room. The room has the dimensions of 15 feet by 13 feet. Each room comes with wooden furniture including two single beds, two desks, two large dressers and two green hard-back chairs. Each floor has a community bathroom. It costs \$1,800 to stay in Sanford for a year.

According to the residents, conditions are adequate in most cases. However, there were a few areas where they said are in need of improvements. For one, the interior presence and design feels dull and unwelcoming, like with the concrete white washed walls, one almost feels like they are in a prison. If one were to compare Sanford with Pearce, one would feel that Pearce is more welcoming.

Also, the public bathrooms, and heating and cooling system in Sanford are topics of

hours are unfair." Blaine Nascimento said; "The Cafeteria food needs improvement, cant eat enjoyable food. And the campus needs to recruit more females."


Alex Holroyde seemed to agree with this as well stating: "There is a lack of females, activities, and parties. People leave because there not having fun."



Presidential Election

Barack Obama announces his run to be the first African-American President of the United States.

In response to critics of his lack of political experience, Obama said, "I know I haven't spent a lot of time learning the ways of Washington. But I've been there long enough to know that the ways of Washington must change."

He gave his address from the Illinois Sate Capital on Saturday Feb. 10. At age 45, he is the youngest candidate on the democratic primaries ticket.

Weapons in Iran

Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad rejected U.S. allegations that Iran supplied weapons to Shiite Militants in Iraq. It has been reported that many of the armor piercing bombs used by Shiites can be traced back to Iran, and the Bush administration is confident that these reports are true.

Iranian Foreign Ministry spokesman Mohammad Ali Hosseini said, "Such accusations cannot be relied upon or be presented as evidence. The United States has a long history in fabricating evidence. Such charges are unacceptable."

Iran has made a stir in the world lately as it has come under fire by the U.S. for its nuclear programs, which the Iranians deny is for weapons. Many countries have sided with Iran on this matter.


Pakistan is a close ally of the U.S. and has deployed some 80,000 troops to the border to help track down militants. U.S. troops have fired artillery over the border into Pakistan on what they think may be Taliban operation centers. They have done so with no official approval from President Musharraf, but still within coordination and participation with the Pakistani military.

A Voice From The Wilderness David Santiago



People tend to treat the Bible as though it just floated down from heaven into the midst of the Judeo-Christian community one day.

While no one actually says that's how it happens, that is more or less how they treat the Bible. The Gospels themselves were not even begun on paper until 40 years after Jesus' ministry. (there are theories of eariler text ciontaining Jesus' teachings but nothing is accounted for until 70 C.E.) Through the entire Bible, one finds parables, poetry, history, apocalyptic literature, philosophical discussion, and personal letters.

One cannot treat every part of the Bible the same. Part of the reason some of us have dedicated our lives to scholarly pursuit of religion is to distinguish what parts of the Bible need to be treated as history, myth, poetry, etc. For example, while I avoid doctrinal debate, I find myself tugged into it at times. One sure way not to win an argument with me is to take a verse or passage from Psalms. This is poetry, prayers and songs written to praise God. Now, take something from any of the letters of Paul. We'll pull out the historical context, the Greek, and so on and we'll see where we can get. Even then, history seems to tell us that the debate never gets fully settled.

Then there are texts that seem to be a bit of both history and parable, like the Genesis account. This is one of the most vicious battles raging today between old and young earth creationist, where historical context comes in.

One has to understand the context that many of this

was written under. Regardless, it can tell us all that we are imperfect and utopia as we see it is out of our reach. Some may see this as choosing which parts to believe and which parts not to,

but it is much more complex than that.

Brian McLaren described his reading of the Bible in his book, "Adventures in Missing the Point"(Co-Authored with Tony Campolo) like this:

"By taming the Bible- by fitting it into our (neat little) categories- we make the Bible safe but boring. The fact is there are parts of the Bible that scandalize me. Not that this causes me to elevate my taste and critique the text (like some theologically liberals readers), or to explain away the terrorist style slaughter of women and children in the name of 'God' (like a lot of theologically conservative readers). Instead I simply acknowledge that a passage bugs me. And I can live with that. Maybe someday it will be resolves for me. Maybe not. That's ok."

I follow this premise but I do not think a completely apathetic to bias reading of the Bible is one hundred percent possible, and I often myself have a tendency to follow the liberal readings, although I try not to take it to extremes.

I guess what I can say is this. The Bible accounts for thousands of people listening to Jesus speak. This is impossible. He was 2000 years too early for the megaphone and sound system needed to accomplish this.

Despite the unreliability of the numbers presented in the Bible, I find it no hindrance to my faith simply to say that yes, it was probably a hundred, but the words spoken that day by a poor working class Jew gave a message of hope that through the ages has reached and inspired MILLIONS upon MIL-LIONS transcending ethnicity, national identity, and ever changing social factors. That my friends, is a true miracle.

The over-all consensus is this, all genres of the Bible, fictional and historical alike, make up the first chapter, or opening act, in an epic we are still writing today. So why do we still need it, because it's the set up, understood in cointext to put ourselves in cintext.

Take the movie "Star Wars: Revenge of the Sith." You can't just open up with Anakin becoming Darth Vader, nor can you just make that random switch from good to evil with no depiction of his confusion in the middle of the movie. This would make no sense. The whole story has to be understood so that one can make sense of the transition.

We need the setup of the Bible to help us in writing the great epic of the Creator and creation today. There will be twist and turns, things will change and thus change how we define certain things in the set up as that they are not what the originally appeared. But we can't just stay in chapter 1.

That is why I reject it when people are so sure they have the absolute correct interpretation of everything. They want to end the story in chapter 1 and live in that, but we can't do that, reality changes. You can never set your foot in the same river twice. But eventually all waters run together.

Please, try to understand the historical and context of it all, read a book about it. But ultimately it boils down to the sign I saw on the front of a church recently: "Never put a period where God has put a comma."


Every now and then, somebody thinks up a new idea that is so totally revolutionary that it just totally revolutionizes everything.

Albert is gone, but fortunately for humanity in general there are still great minds at work, coming up with breakthrough ideas that a normal person could never even imagine without ingesting fantastic quantities of gin.

So I called the company that makes the Ballistic Driver, GPower Inc., of Sunnyvale, Calif. I spoke with one of the partners, Elizabeth Poggi, a serious person who confirmed that the Ballistic Driver is a serious product aimed at people who, for various reasons, cannot swing golf clubs, as well as for people like me who would simply prefer not to.

Poggi stressed that the Ballistic Driver, which will sell for around \$800, has safety features that prevent it from going off accidentally, as well as (I am still not making this up) a silencer. Pat Riley Has the Heat

We extend Pat Riley benefit of the doubt because he's Pat Riley. Anybody else with less aura and less jewelry would be getting savaged for how selfish and convenient his timing has appeared lately in deciding when to coach and not coach the champion Miami Heat.

Riley doesn't coach when the team is in last place or laboring or even bored. But Riley returns triumphantly whenever Shaquille O'Neal does. Riley suspends James Posey and Antoine Walker for fatness, and then leaves poor Ron Rothstein to take the beatings. Shaq is healthy? So is Riley.

The surprise isn't that Riley resumes coaching now that Miami is coming off its single most impressive regularseason victory in two years Sunday's blowout of San Antonio. The surprise is that he didn't hobble down the arena stairs in the fourth quarter and poke Ron Rothstein out of the way with one of his crutches.

Packaging buys you plenty in sports. Riley practically invented the coach as runway model, wrapped in Armani and discipline. He looked more presidential than Stan Van Gundy, whatever that means, and fans love believing in the authority figure as instiller of toughness. Doesn't matter that, in crucial moments, Riley succeeded last season because he gave the ball to Wade and got the heck out of the way. When his choices at those moments for 18 years were Clarence Weatherspoon or John Starks, Riley lost.

Howmuch does perception matter? Consider this: Let's say it wasn't Riley coming and going based on whether the Heat was winning or losing. Let's make it Nick Saban instead. How would you feel about it then?

Riley can do what he wants, of course. It's his team, his power, and he earned it forever in these parts with a ring. Or Wade earned it for him, anyway. But it isn't terribly becoming from the outside when the health issues don't keep you from an offseason safari but do make you limp away when your veterans are fat, satiated, losing and yelling back at you because of all your pushing. In fact, it isn't a lot different than Saban demanding toughness and accountability and overcoming from only his players and not himself when things get difficult. Riley admits he wouldn't have had his hip replaced if his team had been 25-2.

Riley once famously said there are only two states of existence _ winning and misery. But now there's an addendum. There's winning, and there's sabbatical.

We have this bad habit of siding with the authority figures

in sports, especially those with rings. It helps us ignore that grumpy Bill Parcells didn't win a playoff game in eight years. Win several times, even with Magic Johnson and Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and Shaq and Wade, and we're hesitant to even point out that, um, why has Jason Kapono been shackled to the bench for so long when this team needed pure shooting to complement Shaq and Wade?

Look at what just happened with Marty Schottenheimer in San Diego. Something has to be very wrong with his relationship with management, and his ability to get along with his bosses, when he's fired after a 14-2 season. But most of the nation sided with Schottenheimer in an ESPN.com poll, even though all the nation has is partial information on his behavior. Same thing happened with Joe Girardi here. We extended him benefit of doubt for doing his job well, even though part of his job is to get along with his bosses. But if a fired player was by Schottenheimer or Girardi, we wouldn't ever assume the player is right and the boss is wrong.

Riley matters to the Heat. He matters if for no other reason than Shaq respects him, and Shaq stays in shape for him. But it is an interesting double standard in play here. We (the little guy) get mad at the athletes for holding out or being selfish putting his needs ahead of the team, the workplace and, by extension, us.

Marty Schottenheimer isn't likely to shed any tears over the unfairness of his dismissal as head coach of the San Diego Chargers.

Marty knows, better than most, that professional football is rarely fair.

So he'll take his 200 victories and his 14-2 2006 regular-season record, and look for his next coaching opportunity without making much of a stink about Chargers general manager A.J. Smith dictating coaching decisions.

Nope. What will bring Marty to tears for the foreseeable future is the realization that he left another coach a Super Bowlready team. At age 63, Marty, in all likelihood, sabotaged his last and best chance to win a Super Bowl by attempting to hire his brother, Kurt, as defensive coordinator of the Chargers.

According to published reports in San Diego, Marty's insistence on interviewing his brother to replace Wade Phillips pushed team president Dean Spanos to grant Smith's wish of canning Marty.

Given Marty's 2007 lameduck status, it sort of made sense for Marty to want to fill his fivecoaches-raided staff with people he could trust, people willing to walk the plank with Marty after the 2007 season. Buccaneers five years ago after dismissing Tony Dungy. The Bucs had a veteran, ascending team ready to win a championship. They couldn't afford to hire an unproven head coach. They needed a coach who could win now. They gave up a fortune to get Jon Gruden. He immediately took Tampa to the Super Bowl.

Who is that coach for the Chargers?

It's complicated now because of the late date of Marty's firing. Will the new coach have time to assemble a high-quality staff? The Chargers lost their offensive and defensive coordinators (Cam Cameron and Wade Phillips) earlier in the offseason.

The Chargers should think outside the box. I'd try to lure Dick Vermeil out of retirement for one year and pair him with Mike Singletary or Ron Rivera or Jim Caldwell or some other ascending assistant coach.

It would be a mistake to turn this team over to an inexperienced head coach. The goal in San Diego is to win Super Bowl XLII.
